"When I was in year 12 in 2017, I was in the same confusing position as thousands of other students across the country, trying to work out what I wanted to do after school. Hunting through the many piles of pamphlets that were sitting in the corner of the maths classroom, I found a booklet about Doxa. Being a farm kid about to relocate to Melbourne it seemed like a great opportunity, so good Mum at first couldn't believe it was real . . . but I applied anyway.

I remember my first interview, the next year just after I'd started Uni. I was at KPMG, on floor 37, wearing a cheap, cheap suit I had gotten for High school mock job interviews, looking around at a world very different from the cattle farm I called home.

Getting the cadetship was a turning point in my life, I had spent so little time in Melbourne and knew so little about cybersecurity in the corporate world. The training I got from Doxa and KPMG gave me so much confidence and security while I was already learning to navigate such a different world from the small farm life I was raised in.

Apparently knowing how to drive a front-end loader or help bring in a Ewe's milk during lambing season does not help you when you are trying to navigate peak hour on public transport or trying to work out what business casual vs business formal means.

I now work in Business Resilience in Tech Risk at KPMG and love my life in the big smoke, and I can thank those at Doxa for helping me get to where I am now."


thirty year journey. We are the beneficiaries of their efforts and what they have created as we move into a future that in many ways is quite different to that when the program commenced.

In 1993 we had a very rudementary version of the internet (Netscape anyone?), not much email and mostly dial up (28.8k) modems that shared your home landline telephone. Five terrestrial TV channels. International conferencing meant getting on an aeroplane or sitting around one of those three legged speakerphone things. The university I was lecturing in at the time was operating in that social and technological enviroment. It was a top university, but there was very little recognition of what a possible future might look like and how we would prepare students for it. Fast forward to now, and many of those students are well into their careers; many of them in management roles or running their own business. Along the way they have had to adapt to an eye-watering amount of change. But they have; and that is largely due to an attitude of lifelong learning which more often than not comes from study and enquiry habits developed at university.

We can't predict the future, but we can prepare for it. Doxa has always been guided by the maxim of providing opportunity to those who might not otherwise be able to access it. Many of you reading this will have been beneficiaries.

"I started my undergraduate studies with a Bachelor of Engineering to be an engineer. I was lucky enough to get an engineering internship in 2018 through the Doxa Cadetship program at Level Crossing Removal Project (LXRP), my sponsor company. That internship made me realise I like working in the Public Sector/Government.

At this point, I was considering moving to a less specialised and much broader degree. That engineering internship solidified my idea, and I then transferred to a Bachelor of Science degree at Monash University. I enjoyed studying for a broader degree, enabling me to explore various subjects.

I subsequently completed another internship at the Department of the Premier and Cabinet Victoria/Victorian Public Sector Commission in 2019, leading to a part-time role in 2020 while completing my science degree's final year. I was lucky to get into the Australian Government Graduate Program at the Department of Veterans Affairs afterwards.

Talso completed the Parliament of Australia graduate program through the Parliamentary Budget Office and am currently working at the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet. Most of those experiences have been in Public Policy and Project Management space.

When I started my LXRP internship through the Doxa Cadetship in 2018, I had minimal work experience behind me. So that cadetship is where this all started, and it helped me immensely to get subsequent roles. I am grateful for the Doxa Foundation and all the Doxa staff who helped me along the way, and I would like to congratulate the foundation for the 30 years of the cadetship program".


