FATHER JOE BECOMES OUR NEW PATRON

In late November, the two arms of Doxa, the Doxa Youth Foundation and the Doxa Community Club held consecutive 2023/24 annual meetings. The highlight of the event was Father Joe Giacobbe, being made a patron of Doxa. He is beina honoured for his leadership in establishing both the DYF and DCC and his ongoing support for both organisations over fifty years.

In the early seventies, Joe Giacobbe was working as a trainee priest in a parish in Fitzroy, which was a very disadvantaged suburb then. He was keen to provide opportunities for the children and young people in the area to go on holiday. He was extremely inspirational and very quickly garnered broad community support for his dream. He established Doxa the Youth Foundation in 1972 and four years later. our Malmsburv Camp opened.

Over the last fifty years, Father Joe has found many innovative ways funds DYF's to raise for operational expenses. This included holding the first ever fun run in Melbourne and convincing many high-profile celebrities to participate such as Bob Hawke, the Australian Prime Minister of the time and Robert De Castella, our world champion marathon runner. He also set up and managed the Winning Post a newspaper for racegoers with all profits going to DYF. He then sold this publication in 1992 and used the proceeds to establish the Doxa Community Club as a hospitality business to support DYF ad infinitum.



MICHAEL MCINTYRE RETIRES FROM DYF BOARD

We are very sad that Michael McIntyre retired from the DYF board in December 2024. Michael was on the DYF board and its Audit and Finance Committee (AFC) for seven years and was chair of the AFC over the last year.
